




THE SONG OF THE CELL




NIGHTS OF PLAGUE




SEARCH FOR A NEW LAND

A Muslim feudal family in provincial Bihar Shareef faces devastating grief and anguish during the Partition of India in 1947 and then again, the partition of Bengal in 1971, when lines are drawn across their lands and hearts. Originally published in Urdu as *Do Gaz Zameen*, Abdus Samad's deeply emotional and political novel traces the journey of the Hussain family from the 1920s to 1970s, as they travel through the Bihar province, to Calcutta, Karachi, and Dhaka and take us along intensely critical political events that shaped the formation of new lands and new identities in India, Pakistan, and Bangladesh. Abdus Samad received the Sahitya Akademi award in 1990 for *Do Gaz Zameen*.

ABOUT THE AUTHORS

Abdus Samad is an award-winning Urdu writer and poet. He started writing at the age of fifteen and received numerous awards for his works, which includes eleven novels as well as five collections of short stories. He has won the Sahitya Akademi award, the Bhartiya Basha Parishad, the Ghalib Award and the Life Achievement Award from the Urdu Academy, Bihar. He has also served on the board of the prestigious Jnanpith Award.

Syed Sarwar Hussain is Associate Professor at the Department of English Language & Translation, College of Languages and Translation, King Saud University, Riyadh. He has been teaching English for the past forty-two years. He has authored eight books that include a book on literary criticism and English translations of several Urdu short stories and novels.




LEOPARD DIARIES


RETHINK AGEING


DEGH TO DASTARKHWAN




RANIS AND THE RAJ

Traditionally, history has been telling us the stories of kings. In the long tradition of history writing, his-story has always dominated over her-story. Though queens evoke a sense of romance and their stories are told like fairy tales, it is common enough to find that these stories end in tragedy. In *Ranis and the Raj*, Queeny Pradhan has selected six queens. All the six queens are from the nineteenth century and have faced the British Raj, the East India Company and the Crown. From the Rani of Sirmur, who was the earliest to deal with the British authorities, to Rani Chennamma, Rani Jindan, Begum Zeenat Mahal, Rani Lakshmi Bai, to the Sikkim Queen from the 1860s to 1890s, Pradhan has attempted to carve an engrossing historical narrative for each of these important figures in Indian history.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

An alumnus of Centre for Historical Studies, JNU, New Delhi, Queeny Pradhan is a professor of History at GGS Indraprastha University, New Delhi. She teaches Indian History, Legal History, and Women in History. She was awarded the doctoral scholarship from Teen Murti Memorial Fund. She was a postdoctoral fellow at the Indian Institute of Advanced Study, Shimla. She was also an ICCR Visiting Professor at the University of Vienna. She has authored a book, *Empire in the Hills: Simla, Darjeeling, Ootacamund and Mount Abu, 1820-1920*. She has also co-edited a volume, *Identities in South Asia: Conflicts and Assertions*. Presently, she is the Dean of the University School of Mass Communication, GGSIP University.




TEJO TUNGABHADRA

Tejo Tungabhadra tells the story of two rivers on different continents whose souls are bound together by history. On the banks of the river Tejo in Lisbon, Bella, a young Jewish refugee, and her family face daily threats to their lives and dignity from the deeply antisemitic society around them. Gabriel, her lover, sails to India with General Albuquerque's fleet seeking wealth and a secure future for themselves. Meanwhile, on the banks of the Tungabhadra in the Vijayanagara Empire, the young couple Hampamma and Keshava find themselves caught in the storm of religious violence and the cruel rigmarole of tradition. The two stories converge in Goa with all the thunder and gush of meeting rivers. Set in the late 15th and early 16th century, it is a saga of love, ambition, greed, and a deep zest for life through the tossing waves of history.

ABOUT THE AUTHORS

Vasudhendra is a bestselling author in Kannada. He is the recipient of several literary awards, including the Karnataka Sahitya Akademi Book Prize and the U.R. Ananthamurthy Award. Vasudhendra now runs his own publication house, Chanda Pustaka.


THE ESSENTIALS OF HINDUISM




HELLO, BASTAR


IN SERVICE OF THE REPUBLIC




THE SACRED WORDSMITH


MANJHI'S MAYHEM


HICKY'S BENGAL GAZETTE




AN ISLAND'S ELEVEN






BRAVEHEARTS OF BHARAT


RANI DURGAWATI




WHOSE SAMOSA IS IT ANYWAY?


CHINA ROOM

She and her sisters-in-law, married to three brothers in a single ceremony, spend their days working in the family's 'china room', sequestered from contact with the men. When Mehar develops a theory as to which of the men is hers, a passion ignites that puts more than one life at risk. In 1999, a young man travels from England to the now-deserted farm, its 'china room' locked and barred. In enforced flight from the traumas of his adolescence—his experiences of addiction, racism and estrangement from the culture of his birth—he spends a summer in painful contemplation and recovery, before finally finding the strength to return home.

A multigenerational novel of love, oppression, trauma and the pursuit of freedom, inspired in part by the author's own family history, *China Room* twines together the stories of a woman and a man separated by more than half a century but united by blood.

Sunjeev Sahota is the author of *Ours Are the Streets* and *The Year of the Runaways*, which was shortlisted for the 2015 Man Booker Prize, the International Dylan Thomas Prize and the Sunday Times Young Writer of the Year Award. 


THE BLIND MATRIARCH

Her three children are by turn overprotective and dismissive of her. Her grandchildren are coming to terms with old secrets and growing pains. Life goes on this way until one day the world comes to a standstill and they all begin to look inward. This assured novel records the different registers in the complex inner life of an extended family. Ebbing and flowing like the waves of a pandemic, the novel is a clear-eyed chronicle of the tragedies of India's encounter with the Coronavirus, the cynicism and despair that accompanied it and the resilience and strength of the human spirit.

Namita Gokhale is an award-winning writer and festival director. She is the author of eleven works of fiction and has written extensively on myth as well as the Himalayan region. She was conferred the Centenary National Award for Literature by the Assam Sahitya Sabha in Guwahati in 2017. 
THE FRACTURED HIMALAYA

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
BLACK SOIL




BROTHERS


COBALT BLUE




A PASSAGE NORTH





AZADI

APOCALYPSO: Jeet Thayil's first full-length collection, *Apocalypso*, is a gritty, intense exploration of love and its secular limits. Song-like rhythms offer Biblical imagery and a lyric view of the wild side. Detached, tough, and vulnerable at the same time, the raw, intimate poems in this collection point towards the work that would follow. They examine and lay bare the mystery of love—its heartbreak and exaltation, and its redemptive, enduring power.

Jeet Thayil worked as a journalist for twenty-one years, in Bombay, Bangalore, Hong Kong and New York City. In 2005 he began to write fiction. The first instalment of his Bombay Trilogy, *Narcopolis*, was shortlisted for the Booker Prize and became an unlikely bestseller. His book of poems *These Errors Are Correct* won the Sahitya Akademi Award and his musical collaborations include the opera *Babur* in London.
